MORE THAN ONE ROAD TO SUCCESS

eadlines all over the country are crying out the need for **⊥** highly-skilled/middle-skilled workers. Plumbers, electricians, health care workers, legal assistants, machinists, and police officers are some of the careers having difficulty meeting workforce needs. Such jobs require significant education and training, but not necessarily a four-year degree. They make up roughly half of all employment today, and the demand for middle-skilled workers is expected to continue to climb despite the economic downturn.

Right now, American manufacturing is struggling to fill 200,000 vacant positions globally. There are also 450,000 openings in trades, transportation, and utilities. The skills gap is real, and it is getting wider. Job growth is most robust among students with associate's degrees and certificated training in areas such as applied engineering, health care technology, business and computer science.

Preparing all students for college based on the belief that a four-year degree guarantees a passport into a well paid career can be misleading. One would do well to remember that the route to a four-year college degree is littered with dropouts and

college that many graduates find themselves mired in debt, underemployed, and earning less than those with middle skills. Indeed, for many students a twodegree occupational certification, especially in highdemand 21st century technologies, may



provide a better chance of securing rewarding work and providing their families with financial security.

KALAMAZOO AREA COLLEGE ACCESS NETWORK

HELP FOR COLLEGE BOUND SENIORS

oors are opening for many seniors in the Kalamazoo County high schools because of the work of an agency named KACAN and Brenda Pickett, its coordinator. The Tuition Incentive Program (TIP) pays for two years of college tuition for qualifying young people in Michigan, but it has not been widely publicized or used until now.

Ms. Pickett systematically obtains the names of all the high school seniors and submits them to the state to find out exactly which students are eligible to receive tuition help. She then visits each one, helping them do what is necessary to obtain this scholarship. She and the agency also schedule and run community events to help

parents of seniors complete the FAFSA document (Free Application for Federal Student Aid) to obtain other types of financial aid. KACAN has already identified over 200 students in the outlying areas of Kalamazoo County and expects the numbers of students eligible to soar once the largely populated urban schools are included.

WIND ENERGY TECHNOLOGY

earn how to harness the wind and find a greencollar career with a great future.

This premiere Education For Employment program, offered at Kalamazoo Valley Community

College's Michigan Technical Education Center

(M-TEC) is taught by Tom Sutton, KVCC Wind Energy Center's associate director. If you love being outdoors, have hands-on technical skill and a flare for problem-solving, consider this class to discover a variety of new opportunities that tap into one of the most environmentally friendly sources of power generation: The Wind.

The course examines the role of wind energy in creating a diverse, renewable energy portfolio; meteorology; characteristics of wind and issues pertaining to sites for wind turbines; identification of the primary electrical, electronic, and mechanical systems within a wind turbine; fundamental knowledge of how each system operates; basic electrical concept; overview of maintenance requirements for each component; and essential safety practices. This course includes work in the classroom as well as the opportunity to work in the lab.

The U.S. Department of Labor reports that the wind energy industry has experienced rapid growth in the past decade.

"Wind-generating capacity in the United States grew 39 percent per year from 2004 to 2009, and is

expected to grow more rapidly as demand for renewable energy increases," wrote James Hamilton and Drew Liming in an article for the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics. "As the wind energy industry continues to grow, it will provide many opportunities for workers in search of new careers."
