A graduate of the Scotts High School class of 1942, Francis Max Smith, known to his friends as "Smitty," wanted to create a lasting tribute to two "brave young farm boys", Rex Smith, Smitty's little brother, and Ken **Snyder**, Smitty's best friend, who lost their lives in service to their Country. Max Smith's greatest desire was for young people of this generation to remember and HONOR those who gave their lives for this Country, and to understand the sacrifices of these two voung men and those like them who never had the opportunity to pursue higher education or a special trade. To honor their memories, Max Smith

endowed a scholarship through the Kalamazoo Regional Educational Service Agency Foundation **before he passed away in 2015**. Only students attending Climax-Scotts are eligible to apply and receive this special scholarship.

Purpose of Form

An individual or entity (Form W-9 requester) who is required to file an information return with the IRS must obtain your correct taxpayer identification number (TIN) which may be your social security number (SSN). individual taxpaver identification number (ITIN), adoption taxpayer identification number (ATIN), or employer identification number (EIN), to report on an information return the amount paid to you, or other amount reportable on an information return. Examples of information returns include, but are not limited to, the following.

• Form 1099-INT (interest earned or paid)

- Form 1099-DIV (dividends, including those from stocks or mutual funds)
- Form 1099-MISC (various types of income, prizes, awards, or gross proceeds)
- Form 1099-B (stock or mutual fund sales and certain other transactions by brokers)
- Form 1099-S (proceeds from real estate transactions)
- Form 1099-K (merchant card and third party network transactions)
- Form 1098 (home mortgage interest), 1098-E (student loan interest), 1098-T (tuition)
- Form 1099-C (canceled debt)
- Form 1099-A (acquisition or abandonment of secured property)

Use Form W-9 only if you are a U.S. person (including a resident alien), to provide your correct TIN.

If you do not return Form W-9 to the requester with a TIN, you might be subject to backup withholding. See What is backup withholding,
