This scholarship is in honor of two young men from Climax-Scotts who were lost to their loved ones and community during World War II.

Eligibility criteria:

Climax-Scotts High School Senior

The scholarship will be awarded as a one-time award. Upon receiving notice in April that the scholarship has been awarded, recipients and their parent(s) will be required to attend an awards banquet if one is held.

To apply, complete and return this application, along with required documents, no later than 3:00 p.m., February 28, 2025 to the Climax-Scotts Counseling office.

The Rex and Ken – Pride of Scotts Forgotten Heroes- Scholarship



A graduate of the Scotts High School class of 1942, Francis Max Smith, known to his friends as "Smitty," wanted to create a lasting tribute to two "brave young farm boys", **Rex Smith**, Smitty's little brother, and **Ken Snyder**, Smitty's best friend, who lost their lives in service to their Country. Max Smith's greatest desire was for young people of this generation to remember and HONOR those who gave their lives for this Country, and to understand the sacrifices of these two young men and those like them who never had

the opportunity to pursue higher education or a skilled trade. To honor their memories, Max Smith endowed a scholarship through the Kalamazoo Regional Educational Service Agency Foundation before he passed away in 2015. Only students attending Climax-Scotts are eligible to apply and receive this special scholarship.

Mr. Smith was very passionate about many things but two of the most prominent things were honoring and remembering his younger brother Rex and his best friend Kenny and seeking justice and remembrance for the men on the U.S.S. Indianapolis. This scholarship includes two parts.

Part 1:

You need to read several of Mr. Smith's writings and compilations about his <u>life with Rex and Kenny</u> **or** about the <u>U.S.S. Indianapolis</u> then write a 1 or more-page reflection of the topic you chose. This should include:

- What significance the people and events had in Mr. Smith's life
- How and why Mr. Smith honored the memories of those involved
- How you will use and apply the information and advice Mr. Smith gave to you in his writings
- How you will preserve and honor the memories of those lost to future generations



Part 2:

You also need to write a thank you letter to <u>*Ms. Patricia Smith*</u>, Mr. Smith's daughter, as if you were one of the winners of this special scholarship. In your letter you should include:

- Why you are grateful for this opportunity.
- How you plan to serve your Country and/or community, as well as, how you have already served your Country and/or community. Examples might include, but are not limited to: your future profession, your work ethic, and how you plan to give back to your Country and/or community in general if given this opportunity.

Due Date: March 1, 2024

- Your future plans (what do you plan to study, where, why you chose this field, etc.? If you are undecided, what you will do in your next few years to decide?).
- Why you think it is special that Mr. Smith created a scholarship in honor of his younger brother and best friend, so that you could have this opportunity.

It is expected that your submission is typed, double-spaced, 12-point font, spell checked, and uses appropriate grammar.

Section references are to the Internal Revenue Code unless otherwise noted.

Purpose of Form

An individual or entity (Form W-9 requester) who is required to file an information return with the IRS must obtain your correct taxpayer identification number (TIN) which may be your social security number (SSN), individual taxpayer identification number (ITIN), adoption taxpayer identification number (ATIN), or employer identification number (EIN), to report on an information return the amount paid to you, or other amount reportable on an information return. Examples of information returns include, but are not limited to, the following.

• Form 1099-INT (interest earned or paid)

- Form 1099-DIV (dividends, including those from stocks or mutual funds)
- Form 1099-MISC (various types of income, prizes, awards, or gross proceeds)
- Form 1099-B (stock or mutual fund sales and certain other transactions by brokers)

- Form 1098 (home mortgage interest), 1098-E (student loan interest),
