Overview

Project SEARCH is a transition program that provides job training through an unpaid internship for people with disabilities. The program prepares these interns for competitive employment in the community.

Interns complete three worksite rotations to develop transferrable and marketable skills for future job successes.

Project SEARCH in Kalamazoo is a collaboration among the following organizations:

- Bronson Healthcare
- Integrated Services of Kalamazoo (ISK)
- Michigan Rehabilitation Services (MRS)
- Kalamazoo RESA and local school districts



Requirements

- Interns must have a current IEP
- Between the ages of 18-26 and eligible for Special Education Services
- Be willing to open a case with Michigan Rehab Services MRS
- Meet most current vaccination requirements of Bronson Hospital















Helping Young Adults with Disabilities Obtain Gainful Employment
