• Research your options and choose a military branch:

ROTC stands for Reserve Officers' Training Corps. These programs allow you to get a college degree while preparing to become a military officer.

You can choose between Army, Air Force, and Navy ROTC.

Army ROTC

Available at more than 1,100 colleges

Graduates will be commissioned as Army officers

Also includes a Nurse program option

Air Force ROTC

Available at more than 1,100 colleges

Graduates will be commissioned as Air Force or Space Force officers

Navy ROTC

Available at more than 75 colleges

Graduates will be commissioned as Navy officers

Also includes an option for those who want to serve as Marine Corps officers

Also includes a Nurse program option

Each military branch is different. Do some research into each one, so you know which one would be the best fit for you. Once you know which branch you want to serve in you'll know which ROTC program to apply to.

Tip: Some high schools offer Junior ROTC (JROTC) programs. This is a great way to learn about military service while you're still in high school. Check with your counselor to find out if this is an option at your school.

• Research your scholarship options:

A scholarship is a sum of money that helps you pay for your education. It doesn't need to be repaid. In return for an ROTC scholarship you'll commit to serving in the military for a certain amount of time.

You can apply for an ROTC scholarship to pay for some or all of your education. You'll need to find out about the ROTC scholarship options for the branch that interests you.

Questions to consider:

How much is the scholarship for?

What does the scholarship cover?

What is the scholarship application deadline?

What will my service commitment be after completing the ROTC program?

• Check if you meet the scholarship requirements:

Each ROTC scholarship has its own unique requirements. But you'll typically need to meet age and citizenship, education, and physical requirements.

Age and citizenship requirements

You generally need to:

Be a US citizen or be in the process of obtaining citizenship

Be at least 17 years old

Education requirements

You generally need to:

Have a high school diploma or equivalent

Have a minimum high school GPA

Have minimum scores on the SAT or ACT

Physical requirements

You generally need to:

Be in good general health and physical condition

Meet weight limits

Be able to pass a standard physical exam

• Choose schools that interest you:

ROTC programs are offered at colleges across the country. Find out which ones offer ROTC programs for the branch that interests you.

It's also important that the school you attend is a good fit for you. Think about what matters to you most about a school. This could be anything from its location to its campus life.

You'll include the schools you're interested in attending on your scholarship application.

To find schools offering ROTC programs:

• Choose majors that interest you:

The majors you can take depend on the program you want to apply to.

If you're applying to the Army ROTC, you'll be able to choose from a wide variety of majors. The Air Force and Navy ROTC have a smaller list of approved majors.

You'll include the majors you're interested in on your scholarship application. Your choice of major can influence the type of scholarship you're offered.

Talk to your counselor or an ROTC recruiter for more information about picking majors.

• Apply for a scholarship:

Generally, you'll start the ROTC entrance process by applying for a scholarship. This is done online, on the Army, Air Force, or Navy ROTC page.

Start by setting up an account. Leave yourself lots of time to fill out the application.

You'll be able to get help from ROTC recruiters if needed.

Each application process is a little different. But the information you'll be asked for generally includes:

• Wait for a decision:

You'll be notified of the decision by email or through the online portal where you applied. The selection process is competitive.

If you are awarded a scholarship:

Your scholarship will be for one of the schools you selected on your application. You must apply to and enroll in that school in order to use your scholarship.

In some cases you can apply to have the scholarship moved to another school.

You may also have to pass a medical exam before you can activate the scholarship.

If you don't get a scholarship:

You may still be able to attend an ROTC program as a non-scholarship student. In this case you will be responsible for covering the costs of earning your degree in another way.

• Start the program:

As an ROTC student you'll be just like any other college student. You'll attend classes to earn your degree. But you'll also have extra ROTC commitments. You'll do in-class and field training that will prepare you to become an officer.

You'll also need to meet certain requirements each year to keep your scholarship active.
