MISSION OF THE OFFICE OF HOMELESS SERVICES PROGRAM

In cooperation with 11 local school districts, under the Kalamazoo Regional Educational Service Agency (KRESA), we can assist parents and their families while they are temporarily between homes.

Educational services available:

- Assistance with enrollment in school and transfer of student records
- Liaison services between family and school personnel
- Assistance with school transportation
- School supplies and backpacks
- Referrals to community agencies for food, housing, medical, dental and optical care
- Tutoring assistance
- Summer school

WHO ARE HOMELESS STUDENTS?

Students are considered "homeless" if, due to a lack of housing, they reside in a shelter, motel, vehicle, or campground, on the street, in abandoned buildings or doubled-up with relatives or friends. Families that are participating in a "Transitional Housing Program" are eligible for these services the entire time they are in the program.

WHAT ARE STUDENTS' RIGHTS?

The United States Department of Education's Stewart B. McKinney Homeless Assistance Act (Public Law 103-382) requires each school district's Board of Education to ensure that homeless students have access to a free, appropriate public education. The McKinney-Vento Act mandates the enrollment and success of homeless children in school, giving them the LEGAL right to:

- Enroll without proof of residency;
- Choose either to stay in the school they were in when they lost their home OR go to school nearest their temporary residence; whichever is in the child's best interest:
- Participate in the same activities and programs offered to other children including free and reduced price meal programs, appropriate special education programs and school social work services;
- Receive the same transportation services as non-homeless children residing in their district; and
- Remain in their school as long as they are still homeless or for the remainder of the school year if they find residency outside the district.
