

- 200 students ages 2-26
- Students with severe cognitive impairments, multiple impairments and autism


Our Staff

- 125 full-time staff;
 30 part-time; 20 classrooms
- Partnerships with Western Michigan University and Kalamazoo College (60 students daily)





Where We Live



What's the Problem?

- Overcrowding
- 1970's "open classroom" concept – not appropriate
- Accessibility 2 levels
- Inadequate, inflexible
- Safety concerns/control
- Lack of storage
- Minimal natural daylight



The Challenge

- Only effects 200 children in the County
- "Out of sight, out of mind"
- Multiple school districts to mobilize
- Lack of exposure to the program by public
- Anti-tax group




The GOOD News

- Huge support by parents
- Early "need awareness" data collection
- Excellent reputation
- Small millage increase:
 0.39 mils for 14 years;
 approximately \$20 / year.



Connecting with Community

- Produced program video
- News articles that tell our "story" – rising incidence of autism – timing.
- Letters to the editor
- Parent/student participation
- Neighborhood meeting
- Anti-tax leadership meeting
- Parent video



Initial Bond Election

- Narrowly defeated
- .39 mil. Increase; \$29,280,000
- Additions and renovations at the Service Center
- A <u>little</u> more effort!

Second Bond Election

- More parent involvement
- Dialogue and help from Boards.
- Anonymous donor
- Service Center omitted
- Lowered mileage to .29 mil \$25,350,000



Kalamazoo RESA Bond Proposal

Answer community questions...

- Explain the program
- Concerns and benefits
- Overcrowded
- What will the new facility provide that cannot be accomplished now?
- Be specific transparent!
- What will this cost me?
- What will you do with the old building?







Floor Plan




Villages Learning Environment

- Village Square (office, kitchen, storage)






- Sensitivity to a variety of developmental needs






Overhead Rail System
